On Thursday 18 April the Year 11 Parents, Guardians and learners were invited to an evening meeting to discuss the options and subject availability in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme. The Head of School, Mr. Naqvi, opened the meeting by discussing his own personal journey with his daughter who sat the GSCE exams in the UK, and then went on to study Architecture in University. Mr Naqvi also emphasised on making soft skills along with academic achievements. He then introduced our new Marketing and Business Manager, Mrs Mariama Souna, who said a few words. This was followed by a PowerPoint presentation of 12 slides by Mr. Smith, the IBDP Coordinator, who explained the processes involved in choosing subjects in the IBDP programme. The subject's registration form was distributed to the participants and the evening concluded with questions and answers. ### IBDP Subject Availability at BSL

Candidates for the full IBDP study **one subject selected from each of six subject groups.** The six compulsory subject areas are:

- Group 1: Language and Literature
- Group 2: Language Acquisition
- Group 3: Individuals and Societies
- Group 4: Sciences
- Group 5: Mathematics
- Group 6: The Arts (or an elective course).

Three subjects are studied at Higher Level (HL) (240 teaching hours) and the remaining three subjects are studied at Standard Level (SL) (150 teaching hours). Each subject is graded on a scale of 7 (highest) to 1 (lowest). There are also three possible bonus points for an Extended Essay research project and the Theory of Knowledge course submissions. A passing grade requires a minimum score of 24 out of a possible 45 points, as well satisfying a number of other conditions. The available subject options at BSL are:
