Reading with your child

Reading is one of the most important skills that your child can develop. At BSL we try to cultivate a love for reading from an early age. Reading helps your child to improve their vocabulary, comprehension, and critical thinking. Reading also stimulates your child's imagination creativity and cognitive growth. Here are some tips on how to read with your child at home:

- Set aside a regular time and place for reading. It can be before bedtime, after dinner, or any time that works for you and your child but it should be part of your daily routine.

- Choose books that interest your child and match their reading level. You can ask your child's teacher or librarian for recommendations, or let your child choose their own books.

- **Read aloud with your child and take turns**. You can read a page or a paragraph, and then let your child read the next one. You can also ask your child to read to you, or listen to them read independently.

- Ask questions and talk about the book. You can ask your child to predict what will happen next, to explain what they learned, or to share their opinions and feelings. You can also relate the book to your child's own experiences and knowledge.

- **Praise your child's reading and encourage them to read more**. You can celebrate your child's reading milestones, such as finishing a book, learning a new word, or reading a difficult passage. You can also suggest other books that your child might like, or join a reading club or challenge.

Helping your child to do their homework

Homework is an essential part of your child's learning. Homework helps your child to review and practise what they learned in class, to prepare for the next lesson, and to develop their study skills and habits. Here are some tips on how to help your child to do their homework at home:

- **Create a homework routine and stick to it**. It can be right after school, before dinner, or any time that works for you and your child. Make sure your child has a quiet, comfortable, and well-lit place to do their homework, and remove any distractions, such as TV, phone, or toys.

- **Check your child's homework planner and assignments**. You can help your child to plan and prioritise their homework, to break down large or complex tasks into smaller and simpler ones, and to set realistic and achievable goals.

- **Provide guidance and support**, **but not answers**. You can help your child to understand the instructions, to find the resources and materials they need, and to check their work for errors and completeness. However, you should not do the homework for your child, or give them the answers. Let your child work independently and learn from their mistakes.

- **Motivate and reward your child's homework efforts and achievements**. You can praise your child's homework completion, quality, and improvement, and give them positive and constructive feedback. You can also reward your child with a treat, a break, or a fun activity.

Year 1

Exciting happenings in Year 1! This term's theme is 'Being Alive' - animals and plants. Our little explorers dived into the world of animals, sparking curiosity with 'I wonder' questions. In maths, learners revisited addition and subtraction facts, strengthening their number skills and problem-solving abilities, while in English, they creatively shared holiday experiences through words and drawings. Stay tuned for more exciting updates as our Year 1 class continues to thrive in their 'Being Alive' journey!

Year 2

In Mathematics, we will be exploring multiplication and division using pictures and simple equations to build foundational skills. We will be identifying and counting money of used place value to represent order and compare numbers. We will understand different ways to measure objects' length, height, mass, capacity and temperature using non-standard and standard units.

In English, we will be studying different folktales, fables and fairy tales. Students will identify the moral and lessons, retell, compare and contrast stories. We will also be writing poetry, letters and writing to persuade the reader. Students will incorporate synonyms, homonyms, conjunctions, apostrophes and parts of speech such as prepositions to extend their writing.

In Science, students will be learning about biomes and different habitats. Students will learn about what is found in these different ecosystems, and how living things function in these environments.

In Humanities the topic will be the World Around Us. We will be learning about different continents, countries, bodies of water and cities on our earth. We will explore the people, animals, changes, and resources in each region.

Year 5

It has been incredibly busy first week back this term. Pupils have been introduced to their new topic, 'explorers'! It has been fantastic to see the vast prior knowledge the children already possess on this topic. We are excited to research how exploration has impacted modern day living. In maths, pupils reinforced their understanding of multiplication and division by applying the operations to real life situations.

We have been particularly impressed with the improved uniform standards within Year 5 this term. Let's keep these standards up!





This week, in Year 3 French HL we learned about common and proper nouns, consolidated our spelling and practised extracting information from an image. We also began reading a book about animals, starting with the hippopotamus.



Year 6

In English we will be learning about the features of biographical reports, and we will combine our report writing with research into 'African American Change Makers'. The children will be inspired by various historical figures in African American history, they will learn to construct timelines, and be able to situate various historical events against the backdrop of world history. Grammar, punctuation and spelling lessons will continue each week. The second half of term 2 will be 'Traditional tales from different cultures'. This learning will link to our topic study about the Ancient Benin Kingdom. We will read 'Diary of an Edo Princess' by Fidelia Nimmons, and learn to write a persuasive argument for the return of Beninese artefacts to West Africa.

In Maths, Year 6 will be completing work on multiplication and division of fractions, as well as beginning to work with ratios, proportions, scale drawings, algebraic problems, percentages, decimals and statistics.

Our Science topic for the first half of term 2 will be 'Electricity and Renewable Energy', in which children will learn to construct and represent circuit diagrams. They will gain an understanding of voltage and load on a circuit. In term 2 will be 'Adaptation of living things to their environments', including variation and inheritance.

In PSHE, year 6 will focus on the virtues of determination and perseverance, as they learn how to set goals for themselves. They will also learn about managing emotions and mindfulness.

Year 3 French


We are confident that fostering such a culture of continuous training will help maintain our high standards.

FRICA'S INSPIRING ENTREPRENEURSHIP: MY CONVERSATION WITH BETHLEHEM TILAHUN ALEMU

Entrepreneurs are the driving force behind innovation, economic growth, and positive change. They possess a unique blend of vision, determination and risk-taking spirit.

One remarkable example is Bethlehem Tilahun Alemu, the founder of SoleRebels, Africa's fastest-growing footwear company with an initial investment of \$5,000 and five workers. Bethlehem established SoleRebels with a mission to create sustainable jobs for her community. Inspired by traditional Ethiopian shoe craftsmanship, she transformed recycled car tyres into stylish footwear.

Beyond shoes, Bethlehem ventured into luxury leather goods and Ethiopian coffee and is in the process of opening a mortgage bank. Today, her company boasts stores across the world, including locations in Ethiopia, Singapore, Switzerland and Taiwan.

Beyond shoes, Bethlehem ventured into luxury leather goods and Ethiopian Born to a workingclass family, Bethlehem Tilahun Alemu grew up in the poor neighbourhood of Addis Ababa. After receiving her accounting degree from a local university and working briefly as an accountant, Bethlehem launched the idea of designing shoes based on used tires, working with cheap raw materials, and exploiting artisanal skills in the poor residents of her neighbourhood.

I had the privilege of meeting Bethlehem in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in her humble but classic open-plan office, showcasing the décor of local craftsmen with elegance, blending modern ergonomics with Ethiopian traditional values.

What inspired you to become an entrepreneur?

When I see problems and complaints, they become ideas for me to reframe challenges into opportunities. Problems help me to adopt a more positive and creative mindset and find solutions that work for me and others.

What are the biggest challenges you faced starting your own business?

I come from a supportive family and grew up with three brothers. My family had initial doubts about my ambitions, but then they gave me their full support.

How do you maintain the quality and standards in all your businesses that you expect them to be? Of course, I cannot be everywhere, and micromanaging is impossible. I teach others and cascade everything I know to my team. My staff also share everything they know with others, which helps empower everyone in the team and results in high standards.







What are the important lessons you learned as an entrepreneur?

- People want you to lead by example
- Treat problems as challenges
- Do good market research
- Focus on services and serving

And most of all, have positive habits and show consistency at work and in life

How do you keep a work-life balance?

Time management is the key to everything, whether in business or life. I wake up very early in the morning, reflect on yesterday, and gather ideas about what I need to do on the day. By doing this, I get those extra few hours to be myself. In the evenings, I give full time to my family.

Who is your favourite singer? Of course, Teddy Afro and Aster Aweke. What is your favourite book?

The Power of Thinking Without Thinking by Malcolm Gladwell.

What's your favourite colour?

I like darker, mellow colours.

What is one message you would give to our students and youth, especially those who would like to become entrepreneurs?

You're not in a dynamic business if you're not experiencing challenges. Nobody is going to help you. You have to do everything yourself. Be prepared, be resilient, and be better at what you want to do. Do that and repeat relentlessly, but always with a smile.

What is your plan?

As with the motto of my company, SoleRebels, "making the world a better place, one step at a time."

Would you visit Togo and The British School Lome?

I feel proud that Ethiopian Airlines is collaborating with Togolese ASKY Airlines and flies to the US via Lome. I would like to explore business opportunities in Togo and would love to one day visit and also meet the students, staff, and parents of BSL.

She welcomed me warmly into her office with a traditional Ethiopian Bunna (coffee) and snacks called Tefftastic which is one of her businesses. These snacks are made from gluten-free Injera flour (teff) with a touch of chocolate coating to give them a sweet taste and texture. The motto of Tefftastic is '*That's our way of saying be good to yourself and others, do great stuff, and above all, be good to your gut...*"

Bethlehem's story inspires aspiring entrepreneurs to harness their creativity, uplift communities, and drive positive change. She aims to challenge the traditional narrative about Africa and, specifically, Ethiopia, "countering the belief that Africa and Africans lack the ability to create their path to prosperity."
