Earth Day 22nd April 2024

In Science, Mr Snell spent the day with the A/C temperature increased by a few degrees and using the lights as little as possible. The reasons for why saving energy can help our planet were then discussed and how everyone can be a small part of change.

In Year 10 PE, Mr Aryee discussed the benefits of being outside and not staying under the A/C all the time.

The Year 12 Geographers and Mrs Snell calculated their ecological footprints last week and spent Monday's lesson considering how global development and the growing middle class increases the pressure that we place on Earth in terms of the water-food-energy 'nexus'.

Delegates in the Model United Nations (MUN) club spent Monday afternoon researching the challenges created by multiple countries having to share the River Nile as a water source. The most recent conflict involves the construction of a dam on the White Nile in Ethiopia and the extent to which it would reduce water supply in countries downstream. Earth Day encourages collective awareness and action to combat climate change, and one argument is that the construction of the dam will allow Ethiopia and its neighbours to reduce their reliance on fossil fuels and strengthen their economy and standard of living.

The discovery of the importance of having a good chronology in stories

BSL 'Book day' event was held on 23rd April 2024 and it was the opportunity for the MFL team and the English department and students to be involved in various activities.

KS3 students in a francophone group of Y8 HL with Mme Eliane Amegnizin carried out some creative writing tasks: starting from a draft to obtain an interesting fiction story: Mongolia.

Students also read some poems : first one about 'La paix '(Peace) link 1 and the second one, 'Je suis un homme' (is about being a human being despite the skin colour). <u>Link2</u>



The Y8HL group had some discussions around these poems.

The group of French beginners with Miss Claire were involved in discovering different stories and the topic of reading to enrich students' vocabulary, discussed the reasons why we read, (Pourquoi lit-on?) and completed a book reading sheet with information about a recently read book. At the end of the lesson, students each choose a short paragraph from a book to read aloud, to their peers.

In Y9, Spanish group students carried out some reading tasks as shown in the following photos.

They worked especially with the book "Roca Roja" (Red Rock), one of the story books in the bilingual Spanish-English series. A Reading Book for Independent Child Readers. Students enjoyed exploring their 'new' language with original, exciting and varied stories. The parallel text, pictures, and speech bubbles provided a student-friendly bridge to reading and speaking in another language. A quiz page at the end helped check understanding.



LUMNI Interview – We are proud of you

Interview of JESONG SHIN, conducted by Year 12 student ZOE NKPA

Zoe Nkpa: What country are you from if I may ask? Jesong Shin: I am from South Korea.

ZN: How did you end up attending The British School of Lomé and when did you graduate?

JS: My family moved to Togo when I was 8 years old. My parents were Methodist missionaries. I was more inclined to learn English at the time so I ended up attending BSL. I graduated in 2003 when I completed the IB diploma.



ZN: How long were you at BSL for and how would you describe your time at the school?

JS: I had 9 wonderful years in BSL. I learnt a lot from great teachers, and they gave me the confidence to keep going when I left school. The personal lessons in diversity from my classmates were invaluable as well. **ZN: What extracurricular activities were you involved in during your time here?**

JS: I enjoyed photography and playing tennis, which I continue to maintain as hobbies. I also have very fond memories of DofE expedition trips to Kpalimé!

ZN: You got your IGCSE certificate and IB diploma at BSL. News here at school is that your IBDP score is a record yet to be broken. Kindly let us in on your secret to that achievement.

JS: It's nice to be remembered in some way! If you find subjects you enjoy and do well in, I think you naturally have the desire to push yourself further. Working hard will pay off, particularly with coursework for example. However, I think the biggest challenge is maintaining a steady focus and motivation through the years. Dream big but set small short-term goals. Also, learn to enjoy the journey and be kind to yourself!

ZN: What were your subject choices for the IBDP?

JS: I studied Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry at higher level. Other three subjects were English, French A2 and Geography.

ZN: Which teachers had a long lasting impact on you during your time here?

JS: *Mrs* Collins was ever so patient and taught me English at the start. Mr Joy really fuelled my love for mathematics and Mr. Hacquebord was instrumental in helping me decide what I wanted to learn in university.

ZN: Did you form any lasting bonds with your classmates at BSL who you still keep in touch with? JS: I am very proud to have introduced Korean food to Selom Ahadji even before K-culture was a thing! We became friends in my first year in BSL and we continue to share our kids' photos on WhatsApp!

ZN: What university did you attend after BSL?

JS: I went to Canada to attend the Trinity College in the University of Toronto.

ZN: You graduated with honours in Physics and decided to do medicine after that. Why the change in course and was the transition easy for you?

JS: I found out that physics, while interesting, wasn't leading me towards a career I'd enjoy in academia. I decided to combine my love for solving complex problems with a passion for helping people directly. Luckily, with my flexible liberal arts degree, I could choose subjects related to health sciences and graduate with a dual major in human biology. It was tough, especially mentally, feeling like I started late. I couldn't have done it without my partner and family who were there to support and encourage me every step of the way!

ZN: Where are you now, what do you do, and would you describe your current career path as fulfilling in any way?

JS: I am currently a senior resident in urological surgery in 'bonnie' Scotland. Career in surgery is long and arduous but I love what I do. It is a real privilege to be able to help patients and there is not a single day that feels the same. I also have incredible fun 'playing' with cool technologies like LASERs and robots in the operating theatre, so my enthusiasm with physics is not all lost! What I also found incredibly rewarding recently was visiting Senegal to help some surgeons and residents in a university hospital train in laparoscopic surgery. I hope I will be returning to Togo someday too!

ZN: Do you have a family of your own?

JS: Yes, I am married to my college sweetheart from Toronto! We currently live in Glasgow with our daughter, Sofia.

ZN: What advice would you give to someone who aspires to achieve this kind of success you've had so far in life?

JS: Being remembered by my alma mater is truly an honour! While I wouldn't label my achievements as a big success, I've certainly found the journey rewarding and I have gained valuable lessons throughout. There have been numerous setbacks, but I think it is about resilience and having a supportive network to lean on at times. Remember, it's okay not to have all the answers as you navigate through life. BSL laid down strong foundations for me, and I encourage you all to have the courage to persevere in your future endeavours!
