Head of School Message

Dear Parents, Guardians, Teachers and Students,

Your recognition and appreciation mean the world to us, as teachers, and it reinforces our commitment to providing the best education possible to our students.



Moreover, I would like to extend a special thank you to all the primary and secondary students who took the time to express their gratitude to their teachers. Your kind words and gestures have touched our hearts and reminded us of the meaningful impact we have on your lives. Thank you to those students who came to my office and left some lovely presents and cards.

What is 'differentiated' teaching in the classroom?

I very frequently get the question: I would like to take this opportunity to try to answer this. To begin with, 'Differentiated work means that the whole class is taught together, but students are given tasks that are appropriate to their academic ability, level of understanding and readiness to learn.'

Just as we are all unique (fingerprint, DNA, personality etc.), every student has an individual learning profile. Chances are, not all the students understand a subject in the same way or share the same level of ability. According to Carol A Tomlinson (University of Virginia), differentiated teaching considers students' individual learning styles and levels of readiness first *before* designing a lesson plan.

Research on the effectiveness of differentiation shows this method benefits a wide range of students, from those with learning challenges to those who are considered high ability. Differentiating teaching may mean teaching the same material to all students using a variety of teaching strategies, or it may require the teacher to deliver lessons at varying levels of difficulty, based on the ability of each student. Teachers who practice differentiation in the classroom may:


- Design lessons based on students' learning styles
- Group students by shared interest, topic, or ability for assignments
- Assess students' learning using formative assessment
- Manage the classroom to create a safe and supportive environment
- Continually assess and adjust lesson content to meet student' needs

We at BSL have mixed ability classes which is common practice in British and International schools. Students are split into small groups according to ability, but all stay in the same classroom and are taught by one teacher. Lessons within the class are differentiated to cater to the needs of individual students.

There are many different ways of differentiating work, including:

- **Tasks:** different tasks are set for students of different abilities. The teacher may print out three different maths worksheets – easy, moderate and difficult – to cover the range of abilities in the class.
- **Group work:** the teacher splits the class into small groups according to their ability, so they work on tasks with students who are at a similar level.
- **Resources:** this recognises that some students can work with more advanced resources than others. For example, in a Year 7 maths lesson, students who find addition and subtraction difficult may be given a number line to refer to, while students who are more advance are expected to use their mental maths skills.
- Pace: in a mixed class, advance students are sometimes held back by those who need longer to complete tasks. A classic example of differentiation by pace is where students who finish their work quickly are given a challenging extension task.
- Teacher support and dialogue: this is one of the most commonly used methods of differentiating work in schools. After the teacher has explained the lesson plan and learning objectives to the whole class, they will go around the room and spend a few minutes with students who need extra support, explaining the task in more detail and giving one-to-one support, or give the next level challenge to the highly able students.

What is **Differentiation?**



Where work is differentiated by task, there is usually a system so students recognise what level they're working at. So, their worksheets may be graded 'challenge one, two and three,' or 'red, orange and green', for example. Sometimes, teachers will decide which task students should work on, based on their ability, but at other times, students are encouraged to choose for themselves based on how well they feel they understand the subject matter. However, teachers will always keep a close eye on which task students choose, to make sure they are selecting work of the right level.

I trust this information was useful to understand the concept and help you further understand how we at BSL cater to the needs of your children.


School footwear expectations

In Science, Year 8 has been learning about mixtures and methods of separating them. One of the separation techniques was chromatography. This technique was used to separate pigments from food colourings and pen inks. The photo below separates green food colouring into yellow and blue. The students then discussed how this technique could be used in forensic science to identify fake paintings and suspects in robberies from shoe polish that were left behind. To finish the topic the students used the techniques to demonstrate the green chlorophyll in leaves can also be separated into its constituent parts.

This half term Year 10 students have been learning First Aid during one of their P.E. lessons under the guidance of Nurse Eunice, Mr Idris, and Mrs Snell. Having put together their own personal first aid kits and discussed the importance of preventing medical emergencies from happening, they then practiced what to do if someone was struggling to breathe, feeling faint, or acting very confused, for example. After being shown how to put a person into the recovery position and carry out CPR, if necessary, all Year 10s had a go at perfecting these simple yet, vital life-saving moves. All passed the written paper and scenario response which marks the end of this section of the preparation for the first Expedition walk to Kpalime next half term.

If you choose to speak with an adult, you are welcome to bring a friend with you to support you.



IF YOU ARE STILL WORRIED AND FEEL YOU NEED MORE HELP:

- Speak to any other member of staff or adult that you can trust.
 This could be the same person that you spoke to before or someone different.
- The person WILL LISTEN
- You will be asked to talk through the problem.
- You will be given some suggestions to try.
- You will then need to decide which suggestions to follow.
- You will be asked to come back to say if things are better.
- If you are still unhappy you may make a formal statement. This means that you write down on your own, or with someone to help you, what has happened, or what is worrying you.
- Take your statement to a member of Staff listed in this leaflet, saying that you want more help.





Often a problem is one that you do not wish to share with more than one person. We will keep your confidence where we can but, in some circumstances, it may be necessary to tell someone else in order to help you. ONLY the people who NEED to know will be told. This will be explained to you at the time.

If you feel you cannot talk to someone, then write a letter. You can seal your letter in an envelope, put the person's name on the front that you want it to go and give it to Ms Akosua to pass on for you.
